Ye Olde Maine Tavern

LOCATION. Ye Olde Maine Tavern; located at the very entrance to the famous Niatous Country, offers you a haven of rest and recuperation, away from the hurry, worry, and grind of our present day city life. This Tavern, situated in the Town of Burlington, Maine; where still exists the open and free hospitality of those "Old Days", can be reached by a fine auto road or by rail. From Bangor, Maine, a fifty mile drive over a state road brings one to the Tavern in two hours. Take the trail leaving Bangor marked 15 and follow to West Enfield. There, turn to the right on Trail 172 which will take you to Burlington and Niatous Lake. If you travel by rail over the lines of the Maine Central, you will find through service to Enfield where our jitney will meet all parties.

CLIMATE AND ATTRACTIONS. Burlington has a very healthy climate, being at a high elevation, and offers one many attractions. If you are looking for a place to rest and take life easy, here is where you can find it. If you enjoy hunting, fishing, camping, tramping, or canoeing, our camp and tavern are located in the very heart of a sporting paradise. Within an hours run by machine from Ye Olde Maine Tavern you can reach ten different ponds, lakes, and streams where good strings of trout, salmon, togue, bass, pickerel, and perch may be caught. The hunting in this section has long been famous and the excellent transportation facilities make it a very easy place from which to get game out. Partridge, ducks, woodcock, rabbits, and deer are plentiful, so that hunters may be confident of securing their game. Some of the best guides in the state are at your command.

THE TAVERN. Is true to its name and the management has tried to make it as realistic as possible. Most of the furnishings of the old days have been retained and all in all recalls to one the atmosphere and romance of those early Tavern Days in New England. We cater to the Summer Boarder, sportsman, and auto tourist. However if you are planning a trip into the Nicasious Region you had better write for reservations, as we desire to give service and satisfaction to all parties.

TABLE. The table is presided over by a very competent cook, long famous in this section for her ability. All food is home cooked and the aim is, not to serve a great variety, but to have everything taste so good that one will come back for more. Fruit, berries, vegetables, honey, maple syrup, jelly, jam, pickles, milk, eggs, chicken, and butter will be supplied from our up-to-date and well managed farm. Plenty of fresh fish and game in their seasons will be found on the menu. The drinking water is obtained from a boiling spring located on the property and piped into the Tavern.

CANOE TRIPS. We can offer a number of excellent canoe trips as the head-waters of three river systems rise in this section. These trips vary in length from one to three weeks, and take one through some of the most beautiful country in the State of Maine. You will

find excellent fishing all along the line of travel. We can furnish you with hunting and fishing licenses, guides, canoes, and all your equipment. We are outfitters for any and all kinds of trips. We also rent hunting and fishing equipment.



YE OLDE MAINE SPORTING CAMP

This camp is located on Nicatous Lake in the heart of a real fishing and hunting country. One can drive nearly to the door of the camp on a fine gravel road. The trail number being 172. Nicatous Lake is twelve miles long, and surrounded by a real wilderness, which is just dotted with ponds, lakes, and streams. Within a half days travel from the camp one can find all types of fishing. There is excellent ice fishing during the months of February and March. Then as the ice goes out there is great fun in trolling for the big salmon and togue. The many brooks and streams open up for trout fishing and then as the water warms and the fish take to the deep spring holes, here is where the fly fisherman is at his best. One will also find good fly fishing during the months of August and September.

As the air clears and becomes snappy, and the leaves put on their gorgeous autumn colors, then the call of the trail comes to every hunter. This call must be answered, so he packs his duffle bag and begins his annual pilgrimage to the woods. In this section the early bird hunting is excellent and then when the big game season opens one can be sure of his share of the spoils.

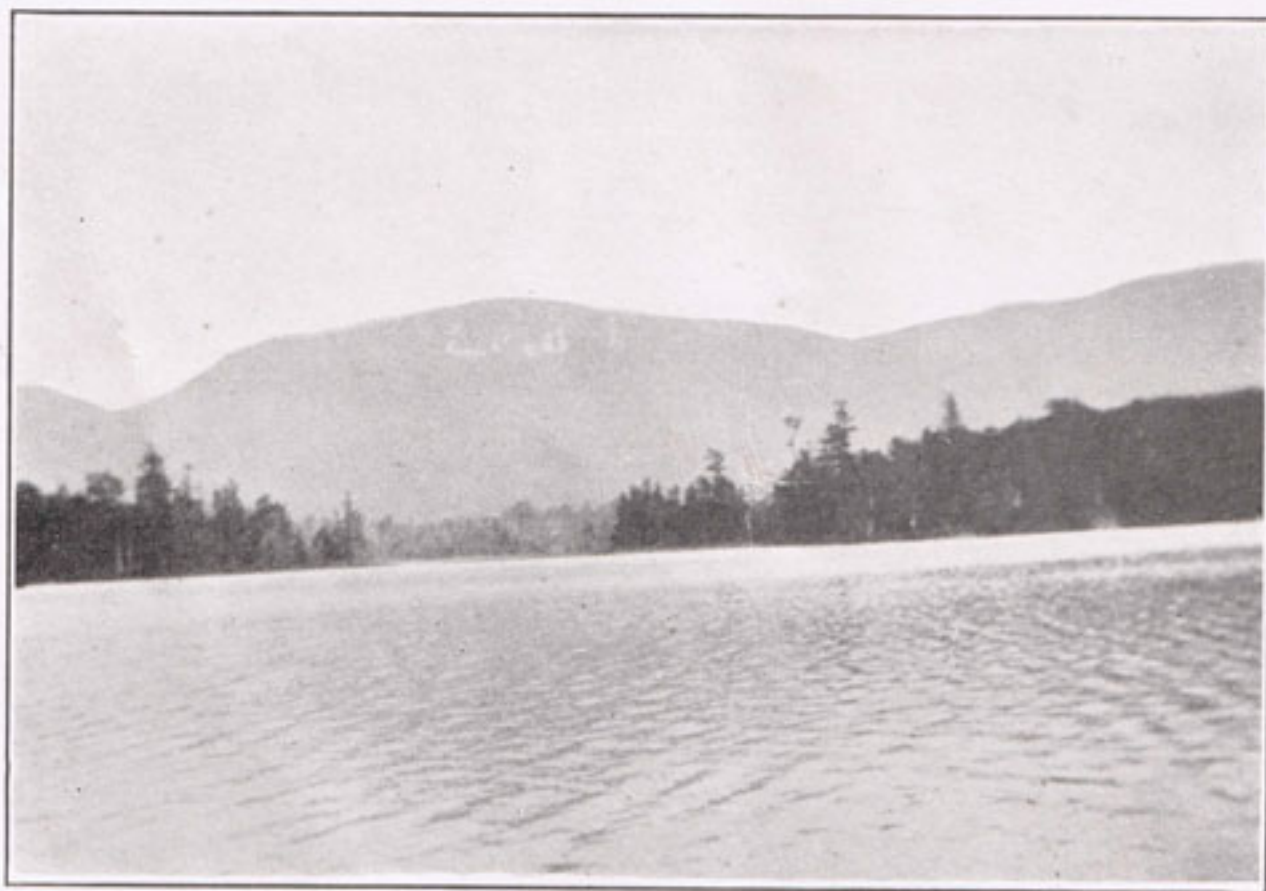
